Healing the Wounds

Thursday, March 2 | 6:30 pm EST (virtual option available) Presented by The Most Reverend Bishop Douglas Lucia Roman Catholic Diocese of Syracuse

Bishop Lucia has been advocating for Pope Francis to reject the Doctrine of Discovery. Several popes, beginning in the 15th century have advocated using the doctrine to justify claiming land. The Doctrine of Discovery refers to a principle in public international law under which, when a nation "discovers" land, it directly acquires rights on that land. Come join Bishop Lucia as he shares his insights and how our spiritual tradition has inspired him to take this courageous stance. *Fee:* \$25, or whatever you can afford.



Most Rev. Douglas Lucia is the 11th bishop of the Diocese of Syracuse appointed by Pope Francis on June 4, 2019. Bishop Lucia grew up in Altona, N.Y. He received a Bachelor of Arts from Wadhams Hall Seminary College and a Masters in Divinity from Christ the King Seminary in East Aurora N.Y. He was ordained to the Priesthood in Ogdensburg on May 20, 1989. Bishop Lucia held several ministerial positions in the Diocese of Ogdensburg, including advanced studies in canon law at the Angelicum in Rome.

Compassion is the cornerstone of most spiritual traditions. At the same time, psychological research has found that compassion is essential for a healthy life. Yet, for most of us, self-compassion is elusive. We are caught in unhelpful and destructive thought loops that lead to self-judgment and unhappiness. Spend some time learning about the science of self-compassion and learn helpful techniques that help you develop

the subtle art of self-compassion. Fee: \$25, or whatever you can afford.

DBT Mindfulness Skills Training Eight Thursdays, beginning February 16 | 1:00-2:30 pm EST (in-person only) Facilitated by Rev. Dr. Steve Moore

Back by popular demand! This introduction to mindfulness training is based on skills from

Dialectical Behavioral Therapy (DBT). DBT mindfulness skills are specifically designed to be nondenominational and compatible with a wide variety of traditions and beliefs. This class will be especially helpful for people who are struggling with their own spiritual practice, or emotional dysregulation,



or want to learn more about mindfulness for better health and well-being. The training will take place on Thursdays from 1-2:30 pm at the Spiritual Renewal Center. Space is limited to 8 participants. This class is not a substitute for psychotherapy but may complement your current practice. We are not able to accommodate walk-ins. Suggested donation is \$25 per session.

I have been blessed in my life to accompany many people as they engage in the *Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius Loyola*. Having done the Exercises four times myself, I appreciate the chance to sift through the stories of Jesus' birth and pray myself into His presence. Walking with others is a unique blessing because I have been able to hear from others about their experience of getting close to Jesus and the Holy Family at His birth.

One person I directed was able to imagine being given the Christ child to hold after his birth. The only thing she had to wrap him in was an old sweatshirt of hers, but it was enough. Can you imagine? Of course, it is not that much different than the bands of cloth he was actually clothed in before being placed in a manger or feeding trough. This was such a powerful and immediate feeling of connection and care that I have never been able to forget it, although it happened many years ago. Hopefully, as the holiday season winds down you will be able to find a way to put yourself there too.
